The G&S Society Centenary Convention

A number of members of the Gilbert and Sullivan Society of Sussex were fortunate enough to attend the recent convention commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Gilbert and Sullivan Society which was held at Grim's Dyke from the 24th to 26th May. There was a packed and very interesting programme including a talk from our Treasurer, Laurence Leng, on Isabel Jay, a D'Oyly Carte principal soprano at the turn of the 19th and 20th Century. Laurence drew on the slides from John Cannon's collection for this presentation which featured many rarely seen images as well as recordings and it was very well received by the audience. Lawrence Olsworth-Peter and Eleanor Jane Moran, who have previously performed for us at the Adastra Hall, also sang at the convention to much acclaim as did Opera Anywhere in a highly entertaining production of lolanthe and we look forward to hosting representatives from this company in Sussex in our forthcoming season. It was fascinating to hear reports from each of the Affiliated Societies represented at the convention including one about the Sussex Society given by Laurence Leng who emphasised how helpful it had been to build links between our Societies. The convention was, in every respect, a most enjoyable event in an idyllic setting.

Below are some reviews of local G&S events you may have seen.

The Eastbourne G&S Society concert: "G&S Abridged", 8th June

This enjoyable concert took us on a Savoy-age, giving us a taste of the entire G&S canon (even *Thespis!*), which went down well with an appreciative audience. The scenic backdrop switched to depict the opera; and with hats, wigs, quick-change costumes and an array of props, the stories of the operas were told (with some funny moments) from the perspective of a character from each.

Godalming Operatic Society concert: "Here's a How-De-Do!" 9th June

In celebration of the start of their centenary year, we were treated to a wonderful "sold out" G&S concert from our friends at Godalming Operatic Society. Narrated by Richard Arthur and Nora Price, they guided us through a fascinating GOS 100-year history. With laughing song and merry dance (and a few props!), the ensemble, accompanied by their 20-piece professional orchestra under the leadership of MD David Wright, were in fine voice.

After the final curtain, Kay Rowan from The National Operatic and Dramatic Association presented a "congratulations on reaching 100 years" certificate to Vice President Linda Scanlon.

Where it all began: A Day of G&S, D'Oyly Carte Island, 14th June

What a fabulous day we had at D'Oyly Carte Island, where Godalming Operatic Society performed four sets: *Patience*, *HMS Pinafore* & *The Pirates of Penzance*, then reprised their recent concert, with a medley from all the G&S operas. Everyone was in fine voice and MD David Wright introduced the passages, along with a few quips, especially as planes and helicopters flew overhead – why would the house be built on a flight path!

With the variable weather, we had the ladies sing "winter" instead of "summer", when it came to "Climbing over Rocky Mountain". And during the Major General's "Sighing softly to the river, Comes the loving breeze" we heard boats and ducks on the Thames.

The nearly 500-strong audience joined in with the Act 2 finale of *Pinafore* and the Policeman's song from *Pirates*. Well done to everyone and to Judith Flint, who took on the task of being Godalming's full orchestra with just her one piano. Between times, it was also lovely to access Eyot House and to see some of Melvyn Tarran's G&S museum collection on display.

Charles Court Opera: The Sorcerer, Wilton's Music Hall, London, 15th June

We were treated to a top-notch performance of *The Sorcerer* by Charles Court Opera (the masters of G&S in small spaces). Directed by John Savournin, it was slick and very funny, so that the packed audience were laughing throughout. The talented, youthful and enthusiastic principals doubled up as the chorus and everyone was in fine voice, under the guidance of David Eaton. MD.

Special lighting and a freeze-frame of the action worked well, particularly in the Incantation by JW Wells (excellently played by Richard Suart) and his disappearance / "death" at the end ... and not a trap door in sight! Pure magic!
